The restructuring of the Deaneries resulted with 32 parishes belonging to 7 Catholic Communities to share God's love, Priests, Deacons, & Personnel. From Elmdale to Kimball, Meire Grove to St. Joseph we all are one big Catholic Community. Each church has their own celebration throughout the summer. St Joseph & St Boniface in Cold Spring have big celebrations with fireworks and parades. They are the 2 largest churches in our Deanery. Smaller parishes have day long festivals starting with Mass & activities outside for all. Food, beer, Bingo, Raffles, Quilt Raffles (handiwork of many hands & hours go into this) at St Benedict's in Avon is July 10th, St Anna June 26th, Seven Dolors in Albany August 14, etc. Do a little research and you can find a church festival to attend just about every Sunday of the summer. The many hours of work that goes into these events are truly acts of faithfulness to our churches as the funds are very important.

Since many parishes are small, these needs can't be met. Catholic Charities serves five areas: 1.) Behavioral Health Services, 2.) Community Services, 3.) Affordable and Transitional Housing,

4.) Supportive Living Services 5.) Social Concerns. The services are available to everyone in the Diocese. Meals on Wheels is run by Catholic Charities and is a great asset to our communities. Read the Annual Report sent last week to all about the great work they do. I know that I will increase my giving to this active organization.

Praise the Lord! What a great day as Roe vs Wade has been overturned by the Supreme Court after 50 years! There has been excellent coverage on TV and now there is more work to do, but Thank You Lord for answering our prayers.

FAMILY COMMISSION

Respite Care Restorative Help*

Forty years ago, the National Council of Catholic Women, in response to the National Council on Aging programming, brought about Respite as an initiative to use Gospel values of compassion and service to others. NCCW members have since assisted and supported the actions of families caring for aging persons at home.

Who are these 'Caregivers'? They usually are female adult women, who work outside the home and still care for an adult who is part of the population which is the fastest-growing age group in our nation. The Administration on Aging projects over 19 million people will be over the age of 85 by 2050.


And the Caregivers' generation is given the name "the sandwich generation". They are many times needed by the older 'Care-Receiver' **and** their own family, which is at home, attending school and a spouse who may be working, juggling support for the family and the task of lending encouragement for the Caregiver.

When the day-to-day stressful schedule points to a 'break' – is where volunteers (paid and unpaid) enter the picture. Perhaps an hour or two off a day a week would be welcome. This brief substitution of a respite volunteer for the caregiver is termed as friendly visiting or companionship for the aging adult. Adult day care centers may be utilized to provide many more hours a day where supervision is provided. Adult Day Centers are usually in communities where a mix of attendees will find others of their peer group.

Parish-based respite programs pair well with community health initiatives. Local Councils of Catholic Women can provide exciting opportunities to work with new partners in their parish to expand their own involvement. Results of quality of life for aging community members are significant and a plus for the Caregiver, knowing support for them is available.

I am a caregiver, now remote, as my Care-Receiver is a resident at a long-term care facility after many years in our home. I retired from the Land of the Dancing Sky Area Agency on Aging, Fergus Falls Office. We received funding from the Minnesota Agency on Aging and the National Council on Aging. I answered Senior LinkAge Line calls and traveled a nine-county area to meet with groups of seniors to deliver education and teach beginning computer skills.

INTERNATIONAL REPORT

Since the Russian invasion of Ukraine began on February 24, nearly 5 million Ukrainians have fled the country and at least 7 million are internally displaced within Ukraine. This is the largest population movement in Europe since World War II. Poland has received the greatest number of refugees from Ukraine, with 2.7 million as of April 13, followed by Romania (0.7 million), Hungary and Moldova (0.4 million each) and Slovakia (0.3 million) ... Since men between 18 and 60 years of age are not allowed to leave Ukraine, the overwhelming majority of the refugees are women and children. Many refugees have moved on from neighboring countries to destinations throughout Europe, and they are beginning to settle where they are. Most are being hosted by local communities or family members, while others are renting accommodations. The number of people in collective centers is relatively low, but they are likely to be the most vulnerable, lacking the connections or means to find alternatives. There is an outpouring of spontaneous generosity and in-kind assistance across Ukraine and Europe, while government and U.N. assistance takes longer to mobilize. As the conflict enters its eighth week, the hosting capacity of local communities may become strained and refugees' own resources are being exhausted, while emergency conditions are starting to put a burden on hosts and refugees alike.

More durable solutions are necessary to sustain the local communities' warm welcome and help refugees restore a semblance of normalcy to their lives until they can safely return to their homes and communities. Inside Ukraine there has been extensive destruction of homes and infrastructure as well as enormous population displacement. Markets and livelihoods have been disrupted, especially in the East of the country. The situation remains very fluid given the ongoing active conflict. CRS will continue to respond to this crisis with and through our Caritas partners, as well as with a limited number of other local actors. Our strategy will focus on broad-based and continuing partner capacity strengthening and technical support to enable local Caritas agencies to deliver safe, effective and dignified services at scale. Given the continuing conflict in Ukraine, CRS and our partners will retain the capacity to respond to the immediate needs of newly displaced and new refugee arrivals, while transitioning to more sustainable and dignified solutions to help stabilize populations. The three main areas of need identified through secondary data and rapid assessments across the region will be the focus of the response:

- Dignified and financially sustainable accommodation.
- Cash assistance to cover living costs.
- Psychosocial services, including counseling and other support for children and their caregivers.

Box of Joy

Parishes and individuals can participate in a program by Cross Catholic Outreach in which toys, school supplies, a rosary, and the story of Jesus are sent to poor children in developing countries. RURAL REPORT

What is your favorite treat to eat on a summer day? Many people would say their favorite is ice cream. According to the International Dairy Foods Association, "The average American eats roughly 20 lbs. of ice cream each year, or about 4 gallons."

In 1984, President Ronald Reagan proclaimed July as National Ice Cream month in honor of the "nutritious and wholesome food." Ice cream is also considered a comfort food.

Chocolate milk is another great tasting dairy product. It is also good for you. According to the article, "Athletes Refuel with Chocolate Milk" in the "Hoards Dairyman" magazine, scientific evidence shows that low fat chocolate milk, used as a recovery drink, helps repair and rebuild muscles after strenuous exercise because of its 3:1 carbohydrate to protein ratio. EASTERN DEANERY REPORT



ACT OF CONSECRATION TO THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY FOR RUSSIA AND UKRAINE



O Mary, Mother of God and our mother, in this time of trial we turn to you. As our mother, you love us and know us: No concern of our hearts is hidden from you. Mother of mercy, how often we have experienced your watchful care and your peaceful presence! You never cease to guide us to Jesus, the prince of peace.

Yet we have strayed from that path of peace. We have forgotten the lesson learned from the tragedies of the last century, the sacrifice of the

millions who fell in two world wars. We have disregarded the commitments we made as a community of nations. We have betrayed peoples' dreams of peace and the hopes of the young. We grew sick with greed, we thought only of our own nations and their interests, we grew indifferent and caught up in our selfish needs and concerns.

We chose to ignore God, to be satisfied with our illusions, to grow arrogant and aggressive, to suppress innocent lives and to stockpile weapons. We stopped being our neighbor's keepers and stewards of our common home. We have ravaged the garden of the earth with war, and by our sins we have broken the heart of our heavenly Father, who desires us to be brothers and sisters. We grew indifferent to everyone and everything except ourselves. Now with shame we cry out: Forgive us, Lord!

Holy Mother, amid the misery of our sinfulness, amid our struggles and weaknesses, amid the mystery of iniquity that is evil and war, you remind us that God never abandons us, but continues to look upon us with love, ever ready to forgive us and raise us up to new life. He has given you to us and made your Immaculate Heart a refuge for the church and for all humanity. By God's gracious will, you

are ever with us; even in the most troubled moments of our history, you are there to guide us with tender love.

We now turn to you and knock at the door of your heart. We are your beloved children. In every age you make yourself known to us, calling us to conversion. At this dark hour, help us and grant us your comfort. Say to us once more: "Am I not here, I who am your Mother?" You are able to untie the knots of our hearts and of our times. In you we place our trust. We are confident that, especially in moments of trial, you will not be deaf to our supplication and will come to our aid.

That is what you did at Cana in Galilee, when you interceded with Jesus and he worked the first of his signs. To preserve the joy of the wedding feast, you said to him: "They have no wine" (Jn 2:3). Now, O Mother, repeat those words and that prayer, for in our own day we have run out of the wine of hope, joy has fled, fraternity has faded. We have forgotten our humanity and squandered the gift of peace. We opened our hearts to violence and destructiveness. How greatly we need your maternal help!

Therefore, O Mother, hear our prayer.

Star of the Sea, do not let us be shipwrecked in the tempest of war.

Ark of the New Covenant, inspire projects and paths of reconciliation.

Queen of Heaven, restore God's peace to the world.

Eliminate hatred and the thirst for revenge, and teach us forgiveness.

Free us from war, protect our world from the menace of nuclear weapons.

Queen of the Rosary, make us realize our need to pray and to love.

Queen of the Human Family, show people the path of fraternity.

Queen of Peace, obtain peace for our world.

O Mother, may your sorrowful plea stir our hardened hearts. May the tears you shed for us make this valley parched by our hatred blossom anew. Amid the thunder of weapons, may your prayer turn our thoughts to peace. May your maternal touch soothe those who suffer and flee from the rain of bombs. May your motherly embrace comfort those forced to leave their homes and their native land. May your sorrowful heart move us to compassion and inspire us to open our doors and to care for our brothers and sisters who are injured and cast aside.

Holy Mother of God, as you stood beneath the cross, Jesus, seeing the disciple at your side, said: "Behold your son" (Jn 19:26). In this way, he entrusted each of us to you. WEST CENTRAL DEANERY

Minutes from the Deanery meeting of June 28, 2022

We discussed the Roe vs Wade court decision; it changed the Federal law and puts the decision on the states. It was suggested we pray the Prayer to Saint Michael as this is very important to fight Satan's influence.

We also discussed the history of Council of Catholic Women. It was founded in 1920 by the USCCB at the same time the Council of Catholic Men. (They have since disbanded.)

The purpose was to unify all Catholic women's groups. We all have a specific goal as groups: CCW, Christian Mothers, Peter Claver Ladies Auxiliary, Catholic Daughters of the Americas, Daughters of Isabela, mission groups, altar societies etc.

But sometimes what we try to accomplish is also the same as another group. So, we can look to the Council as a major resource. The CCW is divided into 3 major commissions; Spirituality, Service and Leadership. Under these three are several committees that produce programs, literature and brochures to help accomplish our goals. (nccw.org)
